Since the game was constrained by an hourlong advisory period, the overtime period was only able to be 30 seconds long. Only one basket was scored in this period.







Kendrick Lamar Halftime Show Review

Since the NFL handed the keys to the Super Bowl's Halftime show to Jay-Z's entertainment company Roc Nation in 2019, there have been multiple memorable and commercially successful performances from a wide range of artists. Beginning with Shakira and Jennifer Lopez, to solo performances by The Weekend and Rihanna, this transfer of power hasn't cut the star level of the performers in the slightest.

And while Kendrick Lamar isn't necessarily any larger than the previously mentioned artists, what sets him apart is what will probably go down as one of the most notorious and successful years a musician can have. The main player in that being the well-known beef with Drake this past spring, which garnered multiple hits from a few lethal diss tracks.

Once the dust had settled, it was fairly obvious to most that Kendrick had soundly won the battle. Aside from this, Kendrick also unexpectedly dropped an album, 'GNX,' this past November, which has been extremely successful, even by his standards. But even with the announcement that he would be headlining coming out in September, well before GNX released, it was not a shock to many after the year he already had.

But did he live up to the expectations? That's a debate to many. In terms of the setlist, it was about what I expected, and I was mostly happy with it. All the songs performed were released in 2017 and after, which was somewhat disappointing, with many considering his early work to be his best. My main problem in terms of the music was that his vocals were often drowned out for any number of reasons. Either his mic was too low or the beat was too loud. The musical guest features were expected, with SZA coming in mid show to perform 'luther' and 'All The Stars,' as well as Mustard coming on stage for 'tv off' and the loud "MUSSSTARRRDDD" within the song.

Aside from musical guests, we also were somewhat surprised with Samuel L. Jackson's cameo as the narrator of the show, portraying the 'Uncle Sam,' a character who has long symbolized the American government in propaganda and political cartoons. While I could go a whole other article into depth on the deeper meaning behind this decision, Jackson's comments and questions towards Kendrick during the show, such as, "Mr. Lamar, do you really know how to play the game?" and the elements of protest and revolution following it were a direct criticism of the American system (the 'game'), especially for the black communities in America who are being systematically discriminated against.

The show was there for entertainment, but the overarching message was one of revolution, possibly hoping to light a fire in people's minds. And I'd say overall, it succeeded at both tasks but still could have used some improvements in its core and fine details.

Duke-UNC Men's Basketball Game Recap

UNC vs. Duke, a college basketball rivalry dating back to the 1920s. Whether you are a sports fan or not, if you live in North Carolina, you have heard of this rivalry. On February 1st, the teams met up for the 263rd time. This game has been long awaited by both Duke and UNC fans, as this was the first time they had faced this season. The Duke and UNC rivalry is known to be one of the biggest rivalries in men's college basketball, with their history as well as their fans proving the dedication behind it.

Duke students go as far as to camp in what they call Krzyzewskiville, or K-Ville, named after their last coach, Coach K. Dedicated students camp out in tents outside of the basketball stadium in hopes of securing seats in the student section for Duke's home games. According to Yahoo Sports, camping for the February 1st basketball game started on January 12th, a whopping 20 days before the game. As well as spending many nights in K-Ville, each tent, housing 12 students, is expected to follow certain rules requiring at least one student to be in the tents 24/7. One Duke student told ESPN, "I know people think we are crazy, and we are," says Sam Freder. "No one should be surprised. It's right there in the name. The Cameron Crazies."

As well as this, both teams fully dress out for the game, with people in head-to-toe Duke or UNC blue, holding signs with memes and messages to their teams to cheer them on. Whether the blue-blood rivalry game takes place at Duke's Cameron Indoor Stadium, or UNC's "Dean Dome," you can count on not only the teams, but also the fans, to make it 6 exciting.

In their most recent game, number 1 ranked Duke University faced unranked UNC at Duke's home court, Cameron Indoor Stadium, crushing them by an astounding 87-70, stretching Duke's winning streak to 15. While Duke had an overall better record going into the game, both Duke and UNC fans were expecting an exciting game, especially because UNC had won three of their last four games at Cameron Indoor, and because their games almost always keep viewers on the edge of their seats.

In the past 10 UNC vs. Duke games, excluding this one, there have only been two games between the two rivals where the point differential has been over 10. However, in this game, Duke dominated from the beginning, leading by as many as 32 points at one point. Two of Duke's freshmen were the lead scorers during the game, with Kon Knueppel scoring 22 points and teammate Cooper Flagg getting 21 points. As for UNC, their star player, senior RJ Davis, and freshman Drake Powell led Carolina with 12 points apiece. UNC started the game slow, shooting under 30 percent of their goals in the first 20 minutes, and ended the half 47-25.

Duke not only started the game on fire and with energy, but their team also towered over UNC in height of their players, and by the end of the game, Duke led UNC in field goals, 3-pointers, free throws, and steals, and had only 8 turnovers to UNC's 14.

While this game went in Duke's favor, nothing is to say the outcome of their next match-up will be the same. Duke and UNC will play again in March.

UNC Student Loses Morehead-Cain Scholarship

Laura Saavedra Forero, a UNC student and activist for disability rights, environmental justice, and Palestinian support, was a recipient of the prestigious Morehead-Cain Scholarship. However, on January 6, 2024, the Morehead-Cain Scholarship Trustees revoked her scholarship.

In November 2023, she posted a cartoon on Instagram connecting Starbucks to the violence in Gaza. Scholarship President Chris Bradford met with her to discuss the post, labeling it as antisemitic. Later, Bradford sent an email to her, warning that her scholarship might be at risk. During winter break, Saavedra Forero signed a letter where she agreed to not participate in attacks toward individuals, spreading "propaganda," harassment directed at individuals, and activities that disrupt other individuals' ability to participate in campus activities.

In the spring, Saavedra Forero participated in the Folk Place encampment, where she was one of several Morehead Cain scholars present, according to two anonymous scholars. A week later, she joined a Students for Palestine march, where participants attempted to block Provost Chris Clemens' car. She was charged with impeding traffic and resisting a public officer, and notably, she was the only protestor charged with impeding traffic. One Morehead-Cain scholar said that "she thinks the choice to charge her is part of a larger pattern of targeting by UNC Police due to her status as a wheelchair user."

On July 24, she received a formal letter suspending her from the Morehead-Cain program.

In August, after charges against her were dropped, Saavedra Forero informed the Morehead-Cain Foundation and sent a letter from her lawyer explaining her situation. She later pleaded her case to the Trustees. In October, she attended a Students for Justice in Palestine walkout but was unable to enter any buildings. A few weeks later she was served with a warrant for materials on her phone after being identified at the event.

Saavedra Forero, frustrated by being easily identifiable due to her wheelchair, received a citation for resisting arrest, which she included in her plea deal.

At the end of the semester, Bradford told her that it was "highly unlikely" she would regain her scholarship, which was officially revoked in January. Although disappointed, Saavedra Forero was not surprised and remains unclear about the specific reasons for the scholarship's loss.
