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JORDAN COMES AWAY WITH WIN IN SEASON OPENER

The evening of August 22nd was perfect for the Jordan Football season opener. Leesville Road High School, ranked 34th in North Carolina, came out hungry to take down the young 33rd ranked Jordan team, making this a fun game to watch.

Leesville Road, a high school located in Raleigh, was ranked second in the 4A CAP conference during the 2024-2025 season, while Jordan was first in the 4A DC 6 conference. This season,

Jordan has joined the Quad City Seven 8A conference, alongside teams including Green Hope, Panther Creek, and Apex Friendship.

With both Jordan and Leesville Road having such strong reputations, this game promised to bring the energy, not only on the field but in the stands as well. The theme of the game in the Jordan student section was tropical, students showing up to the game decked out in fun floral, and tropical prints, and accessories, filling the bleachers to show their support for the Jordan

Football team.

The game started off with Jordan on their heels after Leesville Road scored two early touchdowns. Luckily, Jordan was able to bounce back in the second quarter with a touchdown from DeAndre Evans (senior) and a field goal by Asher Holland (senior), bringing the game to a four point difference to end the half.

In the third quarter, Leesville Road scored one field goal which helped them keep their lead, despite Jordan's touchdown. A missed two-point conversion opportunity kept Jordan from taking the lead, down 17-16 at the end of the third. Leesville Road only earned one field goal in the fourth quarter compared to Jordan's two, ending the game with a Jordan win and a score of 22-20.

Make sure to come out to the next Jordan Football game on August 29 at Durham County Stadium. Jordan will be playing Southern, one of the better teams in DPS, so the game is promising to be competitive.

Infinite Campus Arrives in North Carolina

North Carolina's Board of Education voted to award Infinite Campus the contract the state's Student for Information System (SIS) on November 2, 2023, with all districts in NC completing the transition in time for the 2025-2026 school year. Now that Infinite Campus has superseded PowerSchool. students should be able to expect a more streamlined, and hopefully secure, SIS portal to use at Jordan.

Infinite Campus was founded in 1993 by Charlie Kratsch, and now claims to serve over 10 million students in 3,000 districts across 46 U.S. states, with NC being the latest to adopt its systems in public schools. NC's Department of Public Instruction decided to make the switch in a push for efficiency and modernization, moving away from the aging PowerSchool system, first implemented in 2012. PowerSchool's massive breach. data which reportedly affected 62 million student accounts in December of 2024, furthered the need to move to a better system, even after the decision had been made by the Board of Education. A giant in the education technology field. PowerSchool claims to serve 60 million students in

18,000 districts across 90 countries, though Infinite Campus' surge in adoption nationwide is definitely a threat to companies like PowerSchool and their reach.

Also to note is that unlike PowerSchool, Infinite Campus is not one singular platform, but a base that districts and states are finetuning. North Carolina's version, the NC Student Information System ("powered by Infinite Campus") is more likely to be equipped for exactly what NC students need than PowerSchool, one platform used by everybody.


It is yet to be seen how other Jordan students feel

about Infinite Campus, but from my first impressions, it seems to do most everything PowerSchool did (albeit with a sharp green accent, in contrast to PowerSchool's dull blue), accessed through NCEdCloud exactly as its predecessor was. Infinite Campus will also be more integrated with the Canvas platform for assignments and tests, perhaps making for more efficient experience. Change can be hard (especially if you've been using PowerSchool for years), but adjusting to Infinite Campus probably won't be a Herculean labor.

Jordan to Prepare DPS Book Drive & Sale

A team of Jordan students has been preparing the past few months to launch the Durham Public Schools Book Drive & Sale in support of literacy in Durham Public Schools and beyond. Books will be collected from all around Durham, from schools

AP Exams Could Cost Families \$99 Each

North Carolina began paying for every students' AP exam fees in 2014. This program, with a budget of over \$18 million, supported a record-setting 84,000 North Carolina public school AP students in 2024, according to the NC Dept. of Public Instruction. The budget cuts will remove \$14 million, while leaving \$4.7 million for

economically disadvantaged students. Currently, AP teachers receive \$50 bonus for each exam passed by their students, which may also be in jeopardy. Assistant Principal Ms. Ruby says students should plan to take the exams until the budget plan is confirmed. Students will be able to opt out of exams if there is a cost.

New 'Free Flow' Club Strives to Battle Period Poverty

Period poverty is a serious problem for girls all over the country. Period poverty is the inability to access menstrual supplies due to financial, or other barriers. One in every five female students misses class due to lack of access to menstrual products. This may take several days of school away from them each month, resulting in lower grades and less confidence in school. No girl should have to face this. That is why Jordan will be hosting a new club this year, in partnership with the Diaper Bank of Durham, to support the women of Jordan High School: Free Flow.

The Diaper Bank provides menstrual and

hygiene supplies to girls around the Triangle. Now with the Free Flow club, they can transport those essential materials directly to our school bathrooms. Each girls bathroom and locker room will contain an easily accessible container of

individual pads, tampons, and liners, as well as prestocked kits that can last a student up to a week. The Diaper Bank will also provide teachers with items to keep in their classrooms.

The club's focus is making sure that no girl is

left without any product she needs. To ensure this, members of the club will regularly check and restock each bathroom and locker room around Jordan. Free Flow has already begun putting plans in motion and communicating with staff to

install the containers. They have also raised almost \$600 by presenting a proposal to the Rotary Club of Durham to jumpstart the program.

The club will need all the help it can get to help keep its plan organized and consistent. It is currently seeking students who are also passionate about this cause to fill leadership roles such as Vice President, Social Media Manager, Secretary, and Treasurer. Access should never be a luxury!






