With Halloween approaching, horror movies increase in popularity. One of the classic scary films is The Shining, directed by the iconic Stanley Kubrick. The already movie is psychologically chilling story, but the book, written by the man that inhabits much of to-read-list. Stephen mv King, is an even wilder ride that no Halloween lover should pass up. The story is set up around the Torrence family, Jack Torrence and his wife Wendy, who have a young son named Danny. King is also excellent at portraying complex characters and the human condition. During this book, I felt viscerally towards hateful Jack, sympathetic of Wendy, and immensely joyful to Danny's character. Though seems to be portrayed as the main character in the movie, in my opinion, Danny is the most crucial character to the book. He is clever and mature despite his age, seeming to always know what's going on between his

parents, and his premonitions of a violent future at the hotel set the story as one of the most suspenseful reads you'll ever experience. Another huge difference is that the movie has a sense of spookiness, of course, but Jack's descent into madness at the isolated hotel is not as clear as in the book, which is a slow, painful turmoil since the very beginning. I feel that a good story really has you get deep into the minds of its characters, and The Shining does just that.

Nothing I'd listen to intently, but decent, catchy, well written tracks.

Moving into the fourth track, Father Figure, is when I first encountered what I'd consider to be the album's most fatal flaw. The lyrics throughout the album are abysmal, ranging from confusing to cringeworthy to straight-up angering. It all came across as out of touch, thirty-five-year-old a complaining about her high days school and everyone hates her, despite being one of, if not the most beloved pop musicians of the last twenty years. All the imagery and figurative language feel overindulgent and vapid. The record feels teenage-ish and immature in general, and the lack of selfawareness is deeply disappointing. Two tracks particularly stuck out to me in terms of frustrating content, Actually Romantic, and CANCELLED!. CANCELLED! is frankly my least favorite track on the album, only because it would have been my favorite if not for the terrible lyrics which seem very out of touch and regressive. Sonically, track is a triumph, but the lyrics sully it entirely and leave me bitter. In general. the whole cancel culture complaint feels deeply selfindulgent and tone-deaf, and something we should have left in 2020. Actually Romantic feels similarly tone

deaf, a diss-track for an artist that didn't even diss Taylor, using shallow metaphors to ridicule a pop icon because out-of-context bruised her ego. I am not a fan of Charli XCX, simply because pop and electronic music are two genres I don't actively listen to, but even I can acknowledge that this diss was odd and a very bad look on Swift's part. The album also feels incohesive. there's no real flow between tracks, and it lacks the feel of a carefully put together album. The final track, The Life of a Show Girl, featuring Carpenter, Sabrina feels inconclusive and anticlimactic. It does nothing to tie the themes of the together, despite being its title track, and though Sabrina tries her best to save it, it remains musically uninteresting. The subject matter is the only thing tying the album together, mostly in regards to complaining about fame or bragging about her fiancé (Jason is the better Kelce, and go birds by the way).

Overall, as a non-Swiftie, The Life of a Show Girl was a mess of boring production, terrible lyrics, and a lack of clear artistic vision that did very little to appeal to me. The more I think about the project, the more it angers me, because it had good ideas and lots of potential that it totally squandered. Taylor is undoubtedly extremely talented, and her voice was the standout of the project for me, but her talent couldn't save a self-indulgent, tone-deaf album lacking any real substance. I give it a light five out of ten.

On Friday, October 3rd, Taylor Swift dropped her new album, The Life of a Showgirl, and like many other fans of hers, I hurried to listen to it. I've played the album multiple times all the way through, and I've now identified what I like and dislike about it.

Compared to most of her 15 major studio albums, The Life of a pales Showgirl comparison, and I would put it third to last in order of best to worst albums. It's not terrible, but her other albums contain greater amounts of songs I like.

The first song, "The Fate of Ophelia," is one of the stronger songs on the album since it's catchy and has a good beat, and I enjoy the literary reference she makes through it. I also like "Opalite," "Father Figure," "Ruin the Friendship," and "The Life of a Showgirl." "Ruin the Friendship" has a more youthful and playful feeling to it that I enjoy, and I like the blend of Sabrina Carpenter and Taylor Swift's voices in "The Life of a Showgirl." Additionally,

"Opalite" stands out with a very catchy chorus and melody, and it stays stuck in my head for days after listening to it. But other than those songs, the rest of them "Wood," "Wishlist," "Eldest Daughter," "Honey," "Elizabeth Taylor," "CANCELLED"— are just not as catchy and the music in some of them doesn't resonate with me. Some of these feel more surface level and less unique, and they sound like songs that other artists could be singing as well. In addition, the song "Actually Romantic" on the album, which is rumoured to be a diss track about Charli XCX, seems unnecessary to me, even as a Taylor Swift fan. I think she shouldn't have written a diss track on this album, and that she overreacted to Charli's song "Sympathy is a Knife.

Overall, from my perspective as a fan of Taylor Swift, the album only has a couple songs on it that I like, and while the rest aren't necessarily offensive or terrible, I just wouldn't go out and listen to them on my own. I think that most of her other studio albums are better than this one.

Though the specifics varied, we both agreed that this album was not for us. We are eagerly awaiting Taylor's next project and hoping it appeals to us more than this one did.



The transition to "Rooms" has not been smooth for all teachers and parents. This year, Durham Public Schools required all schools to switch from their current communication system to Rooms since it came bundled with the new website service. district Before its introduction, many DPS schools lacked a centralized communication platform, forcing parents and teachers to rely on multiple apps, emails, and phone calls. Ms. Fontham also helped students set up their accounts in class, which make seemed to communication go a lot smoother. Some parents also said not enough teachers are using Rooms yet. Teachers think that might change as everyone gets used to it. "It's

kind of a chicken-and-egg situation." Ms. **Fontham** said, feeling hopeful. "The more teachers use Rooms, the more parents will too." with the change, teachers agree that the goal is still the same: keeping everyone connected. "Setting up your account is the hardest part," Ms. Fontham concluded. "After that, it's easy. What really matters is that we're communicating, no matter the platform."

As this school year continues, the system will continue growing in the use of it from parents, students, and teachers.

Local 'No Kings' Protest Draws Large Crowd

The Durham No Kings protest on October 18th drew a crowd of around 7,000 individuals rallying against recent actions from the current presidential administration. About 2,600 protests took place across the country, making it one of the largest days of protest ever against President Donald Trump.

There were many signs at the Durham protest with creative messages speaking out against President Trump, ranging from "Health Care not Wealth Care" to "IKEA Has Better Cabinets" to "No Crown for a Clown." All of the messages criticized the administration, voicing the opinion that the president is acting as more of a monarch than a president. The crowd marched in a mile through downtown Durham, holding up their signs and participating in various chants. "It felt very impactful and powerful to have all those people united and marching together," a Jordan senior who attended the protest shared.

The first No Kings protest took place in June, and

although many individuals took part in the original protest in Durham, the number of participants was far surpassed by the October protest. The June protest occurred on the same day as President Trump's birthday parade in an attempt to shift the focus away from the military parade and towards a need to sustain and strengthen America's democracy. The October reinforced protest these values and made it clear that many Americans do condone dictatorship and never will.


class last year. "More people are taking it, and more people are getting interested." As of this semester, Art History has 26 students enrolled, and has the chance to become a very popular Jordan elective.
